#### **New Fish Station**

**Leo and Belinda Ticheli** are from Birmingham. They have a 40' sail boat.



## FCYC REPORT

The May Florida Council of Yacht Clubs (FCYC) meeting was held on Saturday the 17<sup>th</sup> at the *Tarpon Springs* Yacht Club, which is on the west central coast of Florida

above Clearwater. The Tarpon Springs Yacht Club was created in 1949, and it describes itself as the "friendliest club" in the FCYC. It is one of the thirteen founding members of the creation of the FCYC.

32 clubs were present for the meeting. For those of you who cruise (by boat or car), please note that the *Royal Palm Yacht Club*, located in Boca Raton, resigned from the FCYC. As such, reciprocity privileges no longer exist with that club.

Below are several highlights of the activities within other FCYC clubs. We could include more, but these examples represent the overall trend. Looks like things are picking up for several clubs in Florida!

• The Royal Palm Yacht & Country Club (not the same as the Royal Palm Yacht Club mentioned above) will

reconstruct their marina and add floating docks. Their new clubhouse be constructed beginning January.

- The *Smyrna Yacht Club* is replacing their roof but will continue to provide full service.
- The *Captiva Yacht Club* will have 100 members attend the sailing races at Newport, Road Island.

• The *Key Biscayne Yacht Club's* latest sailing race had over 162 entries.

The Education Speaker at the FCYC meeting was Bill McMahon from the *McMahon Group, Private Club Planners and Consultants.* His topic was "How to Market Yacht Clubs." Directors, managers, and membership delegates present found this to be a meaningful presentation.

> Her two grandsons are her "pride and joy." They are close in age

and she has tried to instill in them the importance of family closeness. Rearing one, and keeping the other one every-other-weekend, has afforded her many opportunities to instruct them. Charlene says she frequently tells them, "If anything ever happens to Grandma, I always want you to be together."

At the end of our interview, I asked Charlene if she had any parting words that she wanted to express. She said the following:

"Everything here is so wonderful. I wouldn't leave it for anything. I'll be here up until the day I die, - - -And, I don't plan on dying anytime soon."

Then, she added, "Tommy wanted me to say 'hello' to everyone from him!"

# Member Spotlight

### Mrs. Hazel Shackley "If you knew Hazel like I know Hazel....oh, oh, oh..."

#### <u>PART I</u>

Hazel, one of five sisters and one brother, was born in Coffee County, Alabama in Mixon's Crossroads (not a town, just dirt crossroads) and near the towns or Enterprise and Elba. In Hazel's words, "my father was a farmer on a 'cotton-pickin' farm and I was a 'cotton picker'." She also fed the chickens, milked the cows, and gathered eggs. They had no running water, and it was Hazel's job to empty the slop jar (I had to ask what that was!). For those of you who already know Hazel, she hardly seems to be the type to perform these tasks.

Because her father was a tenant farmer, they moved from South Alabama to Northwest Florida and backrepeatedly. Her father always "found that the grass was greener" elsewhere. 
